This term we have been learning about the life cycles of frogs, chickens and


butterflies. We watched our caterpillars grow, feed, and then transform from a chrysalis into beautiful butterflies before our eyes.

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
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
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Newottle & Charlton School Update

It has been a busy end of term as always. Oak and Ash classes (Reception to Year 2) had a fantastic day at Cotswold Wildlife Park learning all about animals linked to their Explorer topic.



Birch Class (Year 5/6) put on an amazing show for parents over two nights with their production of Robin Hood and the Sherwood Hoodies. It was a great play filled with lots of jokes and amazing songs. They all did so well!

We have some changes in school from September 2023. Ms Rowe and Miss Hirst will be reducing their hours of teaching and so we have appointed two new teachers, Mr O'Sullivan and Mrs Hetherington and we can't wait for them to join us. Mrs Hogan, one of our HLTAs is also becoming a class teacher under the direction of Mrs Lovesay-Bonham who will become our Inclusion lead.

We are also having some decorating done and the toilets will get a partial refurbishment while we move all the classrooms around ready for a fresh start in September. Reception children will stay in a class of their own from September while all of Year 1 will now join Year 2 to make up Ash class (currently we mix Year 1 into two classes). Community Bus Service — A community bus service was being run from the village to Brackley, Northampton, Banbury and Towcester. For more information, please call 'Ability' on 01327 604123.

Street Lighting — If any streetlights are not working, please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council with the lamp number/location and this information will be forwarded to Eon. Please bear in mind that the street lighting contract is between the Parish Council and Eon, so if residents contact Eon directly, they may not get a response.

Fly Tipping — If residents are aware of any fly tipping, please report this to West Northamptonshire Council or call. They will collect the rubbish and also gather evidence, which will then help them prosecute the offenders.

Flag Pole — A planning application has been submitted to West Northants Council for the flag pole located outside the Memorial Hall.

Myers Close Play Area — Councillors will investigate the types of new playing equipment which will be suitable for the play area.

Nature Notes

The Big Butterfly Count has already begun – on the 14th July – but it goes on till the 6th August so you all have an opportunity to help Butterfly Conservation scientists to understand the impact of climate change on our butterflies. All you have to do is spend 15 minutes in any sunny spot – your garden, by a hedgerow, in the Stonepits field – and record the number and type of butterflies that you see. If you google Big Butterfly Count you will find lots of information and there is a mobile app you can download to help you identify what you see.

Last year's record temperatures, heatwave and drought caused some of the plants that caterpillars feed on to wither and die. Lots of recording now will help scientists discover what the ongoing impact of this extreme weather has been. Butterflies are indicators of a healthy natural environment – with half of Britain's butterfly species already threatened or near threatened with extinction, it's never been more important to understand how our insects are responding to the changing climate and to take action to protect them.

Last week we had a sudden influx of Red Admiral butterflies in the garden – four at one time on a single plant. It always seems remarkable that these butterflies have migrated here from North Africa and continental Europe. Their flight seems so un-purposeful, but they arrive in a series of northward migrations and the immigrant females lay eggs which then emerge as fresh butterflies from July onwards. It seems likely that the ones we are seeing are fairly newly hatched as they are very smart and vibrantly coloured. The results of our Big Butterfly Count (done on the 17th July) are: 8 Small Whites, 1 Peacock, 5 Red Admirals, 3 Small Tortoiseshell, and 7 Large Whites. Not bad for 15 minutes work.

We've recently found two new badger latrine pits in different places in our garden. One of them is rather close to the greenhouse and we are hoping that they don't have their eyes on our tomatoes. We have to put a barrier across the open door of the greenhouse during the day against the dog who has proved to be a rather keen veg and fruit eater: we found her nibbling the cucumbers and she has stolen quite a lot of the low-hanging unripe figs. She'd go for the strawberries too if they weren't netted against the birds.

You may have noticed a few very dead young trees in various places. There is one just by the main entrance gate to the school. These are young elm trees which have succumbed to Dutch Elm Disease. Some of us can remember the devastation wrought by Dutch Elm Disease when in the 1970s it wiped out thousands of mature elm trees with their characteristic billowy outline, changing the landscape in a very major way. English Elms do not set seed in this country, but they can and do grow from suckers from their own roots up to 100 metres away from the original parent plant. So what has been happening since the 1970s is that there is regrowth from the roots which grows successfully until it gets to about 20 - 25 feet, when the bark becomes solid enough to be colonized again by the beetles which infect the tree with the disease and it dies. It's always easy to identify an elm tree as every leaf is asymmetrical where it joins its stem, with one lobe bigger than the other. At some stage the trees will win the battle with the beetles – but not yet.

Playing Field update

June was a great month for the Playing Field Project, with an injection of funds from the cricket match and Open Farm Sunday. We're currently gearing up for a further Cricket Match in July with Charlton playing Brackley 3rds which is a great opportunity for the Bar & Grill to be wheeled out and some further funds raised.

We continue to work on fundraising applications. We've submitted stage one for the pump park which we hope to receive feedback on soon and the opportunity to move to stage two. We're working with Passmores to finalise the designs for the pavilion in order to get updated and accurate costings to enable us to submit to a different funding body.

We've received and built the new picnic benches that now sit outside the pavilion for all to use and we've also purchased a new bench! We hope that we'll be able to continue to add to the facilities over time.



As a team we're currently working on some fundraising events for after the summer, look out for dates in September for The Charity Car Wash (all funds raised will be ring fenced for the pump park) and we're hoping to run another Pop up Cafe to support the football and we'll also be holding The Charlton Big Clear Out on Sunday October 15th.

As we wind down for a few weeks off over the summer, we'd like to thank all those who are supporting in whatever way they can and a HUGE thank you to the working party for their continued enthusiasm and commitment to improving this community space.

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
