Operation Hedgehog

You may have read or heard about Kirtlington and many other villages working together to create Hedgehog Highways and become more hedgehog friendly through simple actions.

Hedgehogs are in serious trouble and need our help, their numbers have declined by 90% since the second world war. The decline of urban hedgehogs is slowing but continues apace in the countryside. One of the main reasons why hedgehogs are declining in Britain is because our gardens are becoming more and more secure, reducing the space available to them.

Hedgehogs roam 1-2km each night during their active season so they need access to a wide range of gardens. A 13x13cm hole (5 x 5") in walls or fences will let hedgehogs through but be too small for most pets.



You can make a hole in your wall by removing a brick at the bottom, cutting a small hold in your wooden fence, using a piece of pipework in a wire fence or digging a channel underneath your wall, fence or gate.

Please speak to your neighbours and let's make Charlton's Hedgehog Highway the best around!

Nature Notes

The weekend of the Big Garden Bird Watch at the end of January was filthy rainy weather but we managed to do our hour in the garden in a rain-free interval on the Sunday. The winners were the starlings, of which we usually have a lot: we had fourteen that day. Next were sparrows, with six: we know we have far more sparrows than this in the garden, as we hear them all the time arguing and squabbling in the hedges. They are very noisy birds and tend to live a very communal life. We had six jackdaws, and we see these coming often to the bird feeders. We would prefer not to be feeding corvids as they tend to keep the other smaller birds away. Our tally also included a greater spotted woodpecker, four blue tits, a great tit and a coal tit, as well as a chaffinch and our usual robin and two blackbirds.

Since then we have had a pied wagtail in the garden: we often used to see these but hadn't had one visiting for some years, and we have also seen a bullfinch with its cheerful pinkish red breast and black cap. The female doesn't have this bright pinky-red colour so is less noticeable. We have mixed feelings about seeing the bullfinch as their prime food in season is the buds on fruit trees and they can strip the blackcurrants, plums and cherries of every single bud in spring. This meant that they were on the 'vermin' list in fruit growing areas until recently. They also eat insects when feeding their young and will eat berries and seeds as well.

We love wildlife but sometimes it is quite difficult to love what it does. We surprised two muntjac deer at the bottom of the garden recently and that is really bad news: they appear to have been eating the leaves off the cyclamen plants and last year nibbled a lot of tulip buds off. The dog gave them a good chase but they can easily get away and our garden walls (old field walls) are no barrier to a deer.

At the time of writing we are in a spell of warm and wet weather, but have just emerged from the cold patch when we had 'a beast from the east' and some really hard frosts. It always seems amazing that the snowdrops and early crocuses, which were in flower before the frosts, and seemed quite bowed down by the cold, many of them lying almost flat on the ground, can recover themselves and are flowering away again as though nothing had happened. Each snowdrop shoot produces a tiny amount of heat at its tip which is how they are able to push up through frozen ground and appear so early in the year. We now have a lot of snowdrops in this garden but they don't seem to spread themselves around very easily here, though they clump up and increase that way. Each year we dig up a congested clump or three and then spread those around to increase the display. They will grow in shady places, under trees and hedges and at the back of flower beds where nothing much else is happening. It's always lovely to see them in unexpected places where they must have put themselves, or been spread by birds: there is a random patch of snowdrops under the hedge by the church path, and at the turn by the main road into Aynho there are lots in the little patch of woodland there.

We have had a number of butterflies in the house this winter, Small Tortoiseshells and Peacocks. They come in during late summer and early autumn when it is still warm outside and our houses provide the right conditions for them. When the house gets warm with the central heating they are confused, but the conditions outside are not good for them. The best advice is to relocate them into an outside shed or garage, but they do need to be able to escape in the spring.

Present – Chairman, Councillor Andrew Woods: Councillors Linda Baker, Richard Bland, Andrea Gladden, Michael Loggin and Diana Sheasby and Theresa Goss (Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer).

Minutes - The minutes of the meetings held on 16 & 30 November 2020 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Resignation/Vacancies – There are Parish Council elections in May 2021 and a number of current Councillors would be stepping down, therefore new Councillors would be required. If you would like any information on the role of a Parish Councillor, please contact the Clerk or one of the current Parish Councillors.

Newbottle & Charlton Annual Parish Meeting 2021 – Due to the uncertainty of the Pandemic, the Parish Council would decide at its next meeting, whether the Annual Parish Meeting would go ahead this year.

VAS Pole on Fathinghoe Road – The pole which had been damaged would be replaced by the County Council.

Footpaths - The Parish Council considered a request from a resident to investigate the possibility of a permissive footpath from the Cemetery to Newbottle Woods. Having already contacted the landowners previously regarding this matter, Councillors were aware that they were not in favour at the present time, due to health and safety issues and walkers straying off the path.

Books in the Bus Shelter - The books which are located in the bus shelter in Green Lane, will stay there until the 31 January 2021. Charlton Village Shop & Post Office – The Parish Council welcomed Struan Kenton to his new role of managing the village shop and post office. Thanks were passed to Keith and Stephanie Wilks for all their hard work running the shop and post office for a number of years and the Councillors wished them well for the future.

Street Lighting – The Parish Council is responsible for the street lighting in the village and has a maintenance contract with Eon. If any street lights are not working please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council who will forward the information to Eon. Please bear in mind that the street lighting contract is between the Parish Council and Eon so if residents contact Eon directly, they may not get a response.

S/2020/2391/RES, Land off Hogg Lane Charlton

Variation of conditions 1 (Plans) 2 & 3 (materials) 4 (metre housings) 5 (driveway details) 6 (floor levels), 7 (Construction details) and 8 (water drainage) of S/2019/1210/RES (Application for the approval of reserved matters comprising of layout, scale, appearance, landscaping, and drainage, development approved under outline planning permission S/2018/0036/OUT Two detached dwellings (outline) Additional floorspace within the roof and roof lights on rear elevations.

The Parish Council has concerns that due to the increase in the size of these properties, there will not be sufficient on-site parking, which will impact the neighbours with the increase in on-street parking, which in-turn, could also block this narrow lane for larger vehicles, including farm traffic.

S/2020/2394/FUL

Hunters Hatch, Main Street, Charlton

Part demolition of existing single storey. Proposed two-storey and part single storey rear extension, and demolition of garage with erection of single storey oak framed carport with ancillary space above.

The Parish Council has no objections to this application. However it noted the concerns raised by neighbours with regard to the reinstatement of the front door and the impact this could have on the parking situation on Hogg Lane, as it may encourage drivers to park near to the door and cause congestion.

S/2020/1567/MAF, Forceleap Farm Road to Hinton Airfield Newbottle

Conversion and extension of existing historic agricultural buildings to form a rural centre at Forceleap Farm. This is to include; 6 x office units (B1 use class), 2 x residential units for agricultural workers, 4 x rooms for short term / holiday lets, an events space, and the associated landscaping, servicing and access.

Approved by South Northants Council.

Free Food Boxes – The delivery of the free food boxes in the village had started again for those who required support during the pandemic, due to them self-isolating, loss of income etc. Anyone who feels they are eligible, should contact the Clerk to the Parish Council with their address details.



Newbottle & Charlton School Update

We have continued to keep open for children of keyworkers and those classed as vulnerable this term. After finishing our 'Emotions' topic, we started another whole school topic called 'Walking with Dinosaurs'. It started with some breaking news that a T-Rex had been spotted in the playground and a dinosaur egg had been found in Oak class.



Children at home and in school have been learning all about different dinosaurs, investigating when and where they lived and why they might have become extinct. Children also learnt about how fossils are made and explored the village looking for them after studying the famous palaeontologist Mary Anning. Some classes had a go at making their own fossils out of clay.



For the rest of the term children will focus on their class topics which include 'Through the Keyhole', 'Water of Life' and 'Ancient Civilisations'. We will share more on these topics next month.



We are hoping that we can come back together as a whole school soon.

Home-schooling is a phrase that has been used a lot over the last 12 months during the various lockdowns. I suspect most people, parents and children alike, have found it hard-going at times. For those of us who were last at school when feet and inches were the preferred unit of measurement, it's probably been quite challenging, I know it has been for me!

One thing that has struck me is that children don't just need to arrive at the right answer, they need to show how they got there, especially in maths lessons. You have to show that you, rather than the calculator, has worked out the problem.

That takes time, but in the end its worth it if the new knowledge acquired sticks in the pupil's mind and can be applied to other questions. Taking time to work out the big questions in life, such as: why are we here? is there a God? what happens after we die? sounds like the most formidable homework we could ever be set. The truth is that it is a lifetime's work to grapple with these questions, but we do also need to set aside some specific time to address them if we want to find any answers.

Lent is one of those specific times in the Church's calendar when the focus of our services is on these weighty matters. During these 40 days we can start to develop the spiritual skills to start doing our own working-out, to start moving towards answers.

This year Lent is a little earlier, and by the time you read this it will be underway, but there is plenty of time left before we reach Easter. **You are welcome to join us at our regular Sunday services. They take place at 9.30am every Sunday at St James' Church, Newbottle.**

We continue to have safeguards in place to ensure that our building is Covid secure. You are also welcome to just drop into Church for a quiet time of reflection on your own. The opening times are posted on the Church door, but generally it is open on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday until about 4pm.



Forceleap Farm update

Everything is very quiet at the moment down on the farm, bar the occasional sheep getting out or tangled up in brambles. Up at Forceleap it is the relentless rounds of feeding and bedding all 450 cows who are snug as a bug in their sheds and making sure they stay safe and sound. The spring herd will start calving in March, so we hope it will warm up a bit by then and the grass will start to grow so we can turn them out soon after birth.



As we approach the end of the hedge cutting season, Adrian has been making good use of the heavy frosts to finish this year's program. Our default position is to cut the roadside hedges every year, although we do let some sections grow up, just siding them up for a couple of years, in preparation for cut and laying them in the next few years. Inside the fields we cut the hedges once every 3 years and so we aim to cut a third of the Farm each year. This program means we keep vague control over the hedges but there are loads of berries and shelter for birds through the winter.

The last grain lorries are picking up the last few tons of grain from harvest 2020. This is in preparation for us to build a new grain store at Newbottle in the next few months. It has to be ready for this harvest... a deadline that cannot be moved!
