Playing Field Update — what a year!

As we come to the end of year, it gives us a great opportunity to reflect on what we've achieved. As we write this piece we're excited to share that in 2023 we've raised over £5,000 for the playing field project. If we add this into the funds raised so far it takes us to just over £13,000, which is a fantastic achievement.

The main focus this year has been on our facilities, we've improved the car park, installed benches and picnic benches, refreshed our toilet and worked hard to get plans drawn up for the new pavilion. These plans, which, subject to approval by the Parish Council and the Trust, will enable us to submit planning permission before the end of the year. Within the planning submission we are planning to include the pump park, which will then allow us to progress our funding application with Valencia.





In December we're also excited to welcome back Guy our hedge laying man, to continue the work he started earlier in the year to the roadside hedge.

In 2024, we hope, we will be successful in obtaining grants for both the pump park and the pavilion. We also hope to extend the perimeter path across the bottom of the playing field across to Cartwright road too. We are currently working up our fundraising calendar of activities for the year, continuing with favourites like Quiz Nights, Family Bingo and our

Big Bike Ride, as well as supporting the sports activities with refreshments for both the football and the cricket.

As ever we'd love to have more volunteers to spread the work and also allow us to raise more money, so please do get involved if you can, no matter how little time you can give, we'd really appreciate it (charltonplayingfields@yahoo.com).



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

Nature Notes

We are writing this in November but we cut a whole lot of holly yesterday. This is not because we are going to start on the Christmas decorations yet (it is not even Advent), but because the holly has more berries than we ever remember. A few years ago we admired the holly berries in November but when we went to cut some for the house there were none left. The birds love them, so it pays to cut some good branches which last very well in a bucket of water in a cold place. There are enough left for the birds.

Holly berries are toxic to many animals, but wild birds can eat them. Birds naturally possess a high toxic tolerance, and they just aren't sensitive to the compounds in the berries that are poisonous to humans. We don't know which birds eat our berries, but we suspect blackbirds, and any passing redwings and thrushes. Birds also love elderberries, rosehips and haws (on hawthorns), but in this garden they don't get round to the beautiful red translucent berries on the guelder rose (not a rose – a native *viburnum*) until the weather is really cold and all else is gone. Perhaps these berries don't ripen fully until well into the winter, or perhaps they need a frost on them to make them palatable. Ivy berries are also a good food source in mid-winter, and possibly they also need a good frost to make them edible.

We used to have a pyracantha on the wall opposite the kitchen window, and every autumn it would be covered with handsome scarlet berries – a cheerful sight when doing the washing-up – but we never got to enjoy them for long as the blackbirds stripped the lot within a fortnight. Yet we have a huge pyracantha on the north gable with yellow/orange berries and these always remain untouched for months. We compete with the birds for the berries on several Cotoneaster bushes which are very decorative, and the one with yellow berries (cotoneaster rothschildianus) gets stripped just as quickly as the red ones.

It used to be said that when holly berries, hips and haws were particularly plentiful, it was because we were in for a hard winter, but of course this is nonsense as a tree cannot know what the weather has in store for us. As with the fruit trees in the orchard, the fruits are plentiful or not depending on what the weather was like in the past. Certainly many of the plants in this garden are telling us that they really liked having such a lot of rain during the summer: being on very freely-draining sandy soil this garden very quickly looks parched and unhappy in dry, hot weather.

We belong to Butterfly Conservation and their latest newsletter tells us that there are several moths which might be out and about in November. Moths have such lovely names: the ones you might possibly see are the Feathered thorn; the Black Rustic; the Red-green carpet; the Silver Y; the Merveille du Jour (a stunning emerald moth with black and white markings); and the December moth. Silver Y moths fly around 2,000 miles from the UK to northern Africa to overwinter. Some moth caterpillars have interesting food preferences, such at the rosy footman (lichen), and the silky wainscot (other invertebrates). The cinnabar moth lays its eggs on ragwort, which is poisonous, and the caterpillars absorb the toxin without ill effects (to them), but they then become unpalatable to predators.

Rather a lot about birds this month - though there are still flowers both wild and in the garden, and there are still trees that haven't dropped many leaves, despite the wind and the rain.



We are the new owners of Fox House, the last house in Charlton heading north. The house was in the Covill family since the early 1960's until Elaine Covill's death last year. We lived in Syresham for 26 years before moving to Charlton.

We are continuing the Covill's tradition of looking after Clerk's Piece, the orchard next to Fox House, for the church. The 6 apple trees in the garden provide a good harvest of apples which we normally put down to cider (you can only eat so many apple crumbles!), but the orchard that Mrs Covill planted has many more! We are planning to plant a quince tree for quince jelly, Membrillo and a few Ottolenghi recipes.

We recently uncovered two fabulous Victorian fireplaces at Fox House which we hope to have restored and we found the well in the garden (with the help of Brian Markham who was born in Fox House). We look forward to hearing many more stories about the house and discovering more history.
