#### **Nature Notes**

We have a rain gauge in the garden and as there has been a lot of rain recently it has had a lot of use. July was recorded as an exceptionally wet month and during August there have been many days with a third of an inch, a quarter of an inch, half an inch of rain. June with its lovely warm weather seems a long time ago and the school holidays have been generally damp with occasional days of sunshine. As we garden on extremely dry, sandy, free-draining soil, it has been interesting to see how many plants are telling us that in a normal summer they don't get enough water. The dahlias are taller than usual and very floriferous, the runner beans are reaching for the sky, the sweetcorn plants look huge with lots of cobs, but they need more sun to ripen well. We love phlox, but they are usually looking very stressed about now and needing water but this year they are luxuriant and still looking good.

There was an item in the news last month about red kites stealing food in the Chilterns, which reminded us that we recently saw a red kite taking advantage of readily available picnic treats. We were in the Chilterns amongst a number of people eating picnics before a musical event and suddenly a red kite swooped down and grabbed a napkin full of goodies which had been left unattended on a table, though there were plenty of people round about. This was about 50 yards away and we saw it flying off with the bright blue napkin in its talons. But in its swoop it had dropped a number of the items so it then returned several times to collect the bits which were scattered in the grass. Watching how it did this was a fine sight: it came back, circled, hovered and then folded its wings back and dived, very fast, beak first for the ground, only levelling out at the very last minute to grab what it wanted in its talons and then without any halt swooping upwards again. It was quite a show.

In the past few years we have had occasional red kites around Charlton, but just in the last few weeks we have regularly seen what seems like a pair in the fields either side of the church path. They have a very distinctive cry, a bit like a cat but not really mewing which is what buzzards do. Buzzards are often circling very high up so that you hear them before you can see them, but red kites are usually closer to the ground, and easily distinguishable by their forked tails.

We always like to see toads in the garden and are sure that we don't have enough. There is plenty of food for them here as slugs and snails are abundant. We used to have one resident in the greenhouse but we haven't seen that one for ages. However we found one in an extraordinary place: clearing ivy off a wall and out of a gutter on one of the buildings there was a large toad sitting in the gutter – about 8 feet off the ground. How did it get there – and why? I can't imagine toads being good at climbing but we can only suppose that it had clambered up through the ivy. It's easy to tell toads from frogs as toads walk – or waddle – rather than hop like frogs.

We try to garden to encourage wildlife, never using insecticides, for instance, growing lots of good plants for pollinators, and leaving odd corners messy (this summer rather more bits are messy than we intended), but we draw the line at allowing pigeons and caterpillars to chomp all of our brassicas, and have erected a serious brassica cage to keep them out. So far that has worked, and there are plenty of other plants for them to go to. Courgette plants often get mildew on the leaves, and we have discovered that we shouldn't take those leaves off in a tidy way, as 22-spot ladybirds eat just the leaf mildew, and it doesn't harm the fruits.




